

# Thomastown Meadows Primary School Homework policy

# HONESTY EMPATHY RESPECT

#### **Purpose**

Homework benefits students by complementing classroom learning, fostering good study habits and self management skills, providing an opportunity for students to be responsible for their own learning and by improving the partnership between students, teachers and parents.

### Scope

- To develop positive study habits.
- To develop a responsibility for self learning.
- To compliment and extend the goals and objectives of the classroom program.
- To improve the partnership between students, teachers and parents.

## **Policy**

Parents will be informed in writing regarding homework expectation at the start of each school year. Expectations should include suggestions for time spent on homework, when it will be distributed and when it is expected that it will be returned. Section co-ordinators will be responsible for organising this with their teams. This can best be done at the initial Parent/Teacher interviews. Parents are therefore encouraged to attend and make themselves familiar with homework expectations.

- A checklist of all homework distributed, plus timeline for completion should be recorded by the teacher. In the 5/6 area students enter requirements into their diaries.
- All homework should be followed up in the classroom, eg either handed in for teacher feedback, class correction and/or self correction.
- In the case of students constantly not handing in homework, teachers should communicate their concerns to parents either in writing, by phone or during Parent/Teacher interviews.
- Guidelines for setting homework include:

Prep to 2 – no more than 20 minutes per night

Grades 3/4 – no more than 30 minutes per night

Grades 5/6 – no more than 30 minutes per night

- Homework should reflect the needs of students from a diverse range of backgrounds and abilities. It should be modified if necessary to cater for Integration and Special Needs students.
- Realistic tasks that can be completed with a minimum amount of stress should be distributed. Clear instructions and expectations should help the students to understand what they will be required to do.
- Homework should be interesting and motivating.
- Homework is a partnership between the home and school. Parents have an obligation and are
  encouraged to become involved in the work or reading tasks their children bring home. The role of
  parents in homework is that of critical friend, encourager and someone who supervises the task
  requiring completion.
- Learning Improvement Plans will be used to document homework requirements for some students (see Compendium Guidelines).
